# JESUS: FRIEND OF THE OPPRESSED...AND THE OPPRESSOR?

Last Sunday we continued our new sermon series called 'Encounters', by looking at the story of the Blind Beggar in Luke 18. This week we will pick up where we left off, as Zacchaeus, the deeply unpopular Tax Collector, meets Jesus (up a tree of all places!)

The two stories are connected not simply by coincidence of Luke's gospel arrangement. They serve to highlight an interesting truth about the extent of Jesus' love: It can reach anyone.

Over the past century, Christians across the world have increasingly discovered (or more accurately *rediscovered*) that the God of the Bible has a bias towards the oppressed.

The poor, the marginalised, the widow, the refugee...all receive special treatment and attention in scripture.

So it is no surprise when we see Jesus' compassion displayed to the blind beggar.

But what about the oppressors? What about those who are responsible for the marginalisation and poverty of others? The greedy; the corrupt; the dishonest?

The assumption to make would be that they should be opposed. Indeed, in Luke 1:52-53 we read the words: "He has put down the mighty from their thrones, and the rich he has sent empty away."

Presumably then, if we want to support the oppressed, we must oppose the oppressor?

Jesus' response to this is fascinating. He manages to balance opposing an oppressor whilst at the same time extending comfort and hope to him.

In the same way as the story of the blind beggar, Jesus refuses to fall in line with the crowd and its assumptions. His willingness to not be trapped by binary thinking both transforms Zacchaeus, and also the lives of those he had been oppressing.

While we will unpack this story in much more detail on Sunday, it strikes me that there is an important lesson to be learned about the place of nuance and the need to try and understand those we might be tempted to dismiss or who we simply dislike (even if we do so with good reason).

Are there times when we get caught up with the crowd and make unhelpful false equivalences? (Eg: "If he's good, you must be bad!" Or "You made my friend suffer, so I want you to suffer.")

Jesus entered into the messiness of our world with a radical message of love and hope. It was a message which was offered to all; oppressed and oppressor alike.

As his disciples, we are charged with taking that same message into the world, and consistently living it out through our interactions and attitudes to others.
