

Conforming for Easter

Firstly let me wish you a Happy Easter! Christ is risen! Allelulia!

There is a tendency for Easter to be forgotten after Easter Monday (or after the last chocolate egg is eaten at home - whichever comes first!)

But much like Christmas Day, in the liturgical calendar Easter Sunday is only the beginning of the festival. I think the free church tradition largely succumbs to the influence of mainstream culture by tending to move on too quickly; always looking forward and rarely taking the time to dwell in the moment and enjoy the season for what it is.

Because there is so much to be enjoyed about Easter. After all, it gives purpose and meaning to our entire faith! It is a time of deep joy and celebration. The triumph of life over death and hope over despair. What God has done through Christ is the most momentous moment in history. So why do we usually zoom past it? Why are we in such a rush?!

This is where I think the church traditions which place greater emphasis on the liturgical calendar benefit. They mark Easter Sunday as the beginning of 'Eastertide'; a 40-day celebration of the resurrection, mirroring the 40 days Jesus spends on earth before the ascension. Maybe that's a tradition us nonconformists should consider bringing back?

Talking of nonconformists and denominational differences, it is also appropriate to mark the death this week of Pope Francis. While we wouldn't recognise him as the head of our church, he always struck me as possessing the qualities I would expect to see in someone appointed to such a major global position. His track record of caring for the poor, speaking truth to power and shunning many of the trappings of the papacy made him someone I admired.

He seemed to be the kind of Pope many unbelievers respected as well - more so than any other man to hold that position in my lifetime. I hope and pray the cardinals tasked with electing a new Pope will bear this in mind in their discerning, and in turn elect someone with a Christ-like heart who is filled with the Holy Spirit.

In our ever-changing world, let us commit to praying for the Catholic Church in the coming days.
