When in Romans

Perhaps it's apt that as much of the world's attention turns to Rome and the impending conclave, our focus for this term's preaching series will be Romans.

The longest of Paul's letters is also arguably the most influential. Hundreds of thousands of words have been written in commentaries, expounding every word of every verse. Some of the most notable theologians of all time have attempted to interpret it, including Augustine, Luther, Calvin and Wesley. Let me be clear in stating I am not trying to add 'Timothy' to that list!

Paul's words have been used to bring comfort at funerals, and as justification in doctrinal disputes including those surrounding women in ministry and same-sex relationships. It is undoubtedly a heavyweight among the New Testament writings.

So what possessed me to tackle such a meaty preaching series?!

I have found myself asking that very question more than once in recent weeks!

The truth is that Romans just keeps cropping up everywhere I look. Two of our small groups have recently studied it, and in my times of prayer it keeps returning to me. So having largely avoided delving too far into it since I became a minister, I felt convicted that now is the right time. I believe that God has something to say to us through the study of this letter, and I hope you will find it interesting, challenging and encouraging.

By way of preparation for this new sermon series, I invite you to reflect upon what I believe to be the key fundamental driver underpinning Paul's letter: That Jesus Christ has come, and has left nothing untouched.

The earth-shattering events of the crucifixion and resurrection have revealed Jesus to truly be the Son of God, and this revelation has transformed human existence. Everything Paul writes about, he does with the sure and certain hope that Christ has come, and will return to fully install God's Kingdom on earth.

If we can understand that and keep it in mind as we travel through this letter together, my hope is that we will retain a proper sense of perspective, and remain open to Jesus transforming us as we engage with his living word.

When in Romans, don't do as the Romans do, but remember what Jesus did and still does!

We all had the opportunity to practise CPR on three different sized "dummies" – adult, child and baby. We were also able to try out defibrillators and bandage wounds and broken limbs. Neal said "I left the course feeling so much more confident about coping with unexpected situations, than when I started"

The next course is scheduled for Saturday 17th May – from 9:30 to 15.00. The course is already paid for, but we do have some capacity for others to join in.
