

Small Groups: The Home of Pastoral Care

Each week in May we have heard from different people about their experiences of belonging to a small group. This week it's the turn of Judith and Kelvin, who recently stepped down from leading a group after 20 years. They share how pastoral care became a key part of their group. Right at the very beginning, in 2005, we agreed within the group some core guiding values, "We share, we care, we are there for each other". Confidentiality within the group was also core value; everyone needs to know that what is shared within the group stays within the group, unless of course permission is given to share wider. An example of this was that one of our group received a terminal cancer diagnosis but didn't want it shared wider as they wanted no fuss and carry on as normal. Even until shortly before their death and the illness became obvious, confidentiality was kept, so the group could pray for and support them.

Building trust is essential to being able to freely share, which means we could support each other, without judgement, in prayer and practical ways through all life's challenges, sorrows and of course its joys. Opportunities to encourage sharing and getting to know each other better can often best be done in more social settings, for example. Bringing a cup or mug with special significance, on one occasion and sharing its 'story', allowed people to share something about themselves and was then used as we shared communion together.

Communication is essential so that urgent prays and help can be sought quickly. An example was during heavy rain a member feared being flooded but the group rallied and sandbags around the front door brought reassurance, knowing people cared. We always sent a group update after a meeting so that everyone was up to date with the group meeting and future plans. On the update was always Praise and Prayer requests.

Over the years of group leadership, we were aware that everyone in the group brought different, knowledge, skills and capabilities, which when shared makes the whole group stronger.

For more involved issues, the NBC Pastoral team can support the Small Groups if required and confidentiality is maintained.

It has been a joy and privilege, over 20 years, to facilitate our groups and we continue to pray that Small Groups will be at the heart of NBC.

Spring Harvest Reflections

A group of 14 made their way from Newbury to Butlins in Minehead during the Easter holidays to be part of Spring Harvest 2025. The theme for this year was No Greater Story and focused on Isaiah. One of the key points was that none of us get the story we want or choose but we were encouraged to rediscover our place in God's epic adventure.

For the adults the mornings were spent with a choice of different seminars and Bible teaching. The afternoons had more seminars and a range of different activities, sports and crafts. We spent our afternoons at the swimming pool, fairground or the newly opened Sky Park. For those without children they enjoyed walks along the seafront at a slower pace!

The evenings included an extended time of worship and different speakers sharing challenging messages. Events do run late into the night but I don't think any of our group attended them.

All of our children joined the 5-11 Kids' Club and were part of 700 children in that age group. They had a session every morning and every evening and they didn't miss a single one. There were also sessions for 0-4's and teens. Spring Harvest recently announced that 631 children and teens gave their life to Jesus across both events this year! It is really exciting for our children to have the opportunity to worship with others in that environment, so they can see that the church is bigger than NBC. Those of us with children all chose the catered option and the children very much enjoyed having their own table and helping themselves to the variety of food on offer. The ice cream and drinks machines were definitely a big hit! For the adults not having to cook, clear up and having adult conversations were the highlights of meal times.

Some of reflections from the adults include:

It was nice to have an extended amount of time with members of our church family and to see the children building their relationships too.

The event was so well organised and the quality of the seminars, which were brilliantly delivered, were thought provoking and full of wisdom.

The worship was a highlight for me! As well as having the time and space to listen to amazing Bible teaching and spend extended time each day focussed on God away from the distractions of every day life. I was challenged by a speaker saying we should be praying for God to show us how He wants us to fit into His plan and to reveal what He is already doing in our community and asking Him how He wants us to get involved. It was a challenge to reframe the question and ask God to reveal what He is already doing and the part we can play in that.

And some highlights from the children:

The slides, friends and the songs.

Swimming and Skypark. Kid's Club had lots of variety and something that everyone could enjoy, I liked the prayer times as we prayed with actions.

Skypark slides especially when they were wet and we took our shoes off and slid down on our coats – even though I did get lots of bruises!

I liked the talks at Kids' Club, the leaders spoke about when they were younger so I could relate. The prayer time was quiet and peaceful but you could feel God was there. The worship was very energetic with lots of clapping and jumping!

Some of us are already looking forward to returning next year! It is a wonderful opportunity to connect with God, to spend time with others from our church family and your day is what you make it, you can go to as many or as few of the seminars, teaching and activities as you want.

Use our church, our prayers, and our witness to spread the good news that in Christ, barriers can come down and enemies can become friends.

We pray trusting in the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
